



#### How to run an Identify Workshop with your colleagues or tenants/customers

This is a workshop structure that can be used by you in meetings to generate discussion around what the Housing Futures challenge area should be for your region – please email **bethan.buck@housing.org.uk** for an accompanying PowerPoint presentation.

Depending on how much time you have, you can run a version of this exercise in 15 minutes or up to an hour and a half. Of course, the more time you are able to commit to it the better – it's a great exercise for generating discussion and getting deeper into the challenge areas.

**Step 1:** Hand out 3 x postits or pieces of paper for each participant and ask them to write the following (one answer per piece of paper):

✤ What do you think the challenge should be?e.g. our ageing population.

✤ Why this matters (your view) e.g. the homes that we own are not suitable for our tenants/customers to grow old in.

What have you seen/heard to support this e.g. a report from the Centre for Ageing Better or a conversation with a tenant/customer.

### **Step 2:** Put them on the wall in rows and discuss:

✤ Note where there are commonalities and differences, talking through each area e.g. one potential challenge is sustainable building but only one of you has written about this theme- does anyone else agree? Why/why not?

Combine and merge ones which are similar to create top-line themes e.g. this cluster all relate to climate change, are there any others that fit that theme?

✤ If time, ask participants to contribute to the challenges you have on the wall- what they do and don't like for each of the challenges (extra post-its needed here!)

# **Step 3:** Finish up with a consensus view- what are the areas that feel like a shared priority?

Give each person a heart shaped post-it note and ask them to place it on the challenge they feel most strongly should be taken forward by Housing Futures in your region.



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
